The second event is the Direct Care Pre-Conference that is a part of the larger Annual Conference for Together the Voice.



The Child & Youth Care Certification Board (CYCCB) provides an assessment process and certification to child and youth care practitioners who demonstrate their commitment to high standards of care and commitment to ongoing competence development. The CYC certification program is the most rigorous demonstration of competence in the field.

Steps in the Certification Process: CYCCB uses a multimethod approach to competence demonstration. Certification

is awarded to candidates who successfully demonstrate their CYC competence through completion of all the steps listed below:

STEP ONE - CHOOSE LEVEL

Determine which certification level best describes your experience, training/education and level of competence. Choose the highest level at which you qualify. Practitioners can apply at any of the three CYC certification levels: Entry(CYC), Associate (CYC-A), and Professional (CYC-P). It is not necessary to complete certification at a lower level before applying at a higher level. The Entry and Associate Levels are not available in Canada.

STEP TWO - TEST

Schedule and complete testing with a passing score. Practitioners are typically able to pass the situational judgement exam at the highest level for which they qualify.

STEP THREE - COMPLETE APPLICATION

Complete an application form for the level chosen and provide supporting documentation. This includes documenting: 1) minimum requirements of education, experience & training; 2) provision of colleague references & supervisor assessment; 3) proof of membership in a professional association; 4) agreement to abide by ethical standards; and 5) confirmation of eligibility to work with children, youth & families.

STEP FOUR - COMPLETE PORTFOLIO

Complete a written portfolio (professional level only).

STEP FIVE - RENEW CREDENTIAL

Renew certificate on a two-year cycle.

The Down Syndrome Association of Wisconsin's (DSAW) mission is to provide support to Wisconsin families and individuals with Down syndrome and related disabilities through awareness, education, information, programs, services, and the exchange of ideas and experiences.

DSAW offers services for individuals across their lifespan, from the moments following a diagnosis through old age. We also support the families and networks of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD).

Parent's First Call for New and Expectant Parents

DSAW provides baskets to new and expectant parents filled with books, community resources, and fun goodies for our new families.

Support Parents & Support Groups

DSAW matches new and expectant parents with Support Parents - other parents of children with Down syndrome who have walked in their shoes, and can provide friendship and support. DSAW also offers Support Groups for parents, grandparents, siblings, and more.

Education

DSAW offers full resource libraries online for parents and caregivers. We also have a digital webinar library. We provide trainings to schools, employers, and the community. We educate medical professionals on how to deliver a diagnosis of Down syndrome and how to work with patients with disabilities.

Fraternal Support

DSAW puts on fun, family events across Wisconsin to foster fraternal support and community.

Awareness

DSAW works to raise awareness of Down syndrome and other disabilities in the community. We host eight Awareness Walks across the state of Wisconsin, in addition to awareness media campaigns.

Home & Community-Based Services

DSAW offers Home & DSAW community-Based Services (HCBS) to children and adults with IDD. We provide one-on-one services and skills training, group programs, and classes. Our DSAW Connects virtual education series is for children ages 10+. These virtual classes focus on topics ranging from social skills to cooking to sports. DSAW staff also provide one-on-one daily living skills training at home and/or in the community. We can work with children and adults on skills such as learning to count money, easy meal prep/kitchen skills, safety, social skills, self-care, potty training, and more.

Employment Services

DSAW offers Employment Services including career discovery, work readiness, and work-based learning to people with disabilities in Wisconsin. We also provide employer training and education.

Aging Services

DSAW works to serve aging individuals with Down syndrome and their families. We have support opportunities for loved ones and caregivers, educational opportunities, resources, and more.



\$1 MILLION FUNDING OPPORTUNITY FROM MCKENZIE

Scholz Nonprofit Law LLC

Practical Legal and Strategic Advice for Nonprofits

[Editor's Note: The following is reprinted with thanks to the Scholz Law Firm which has been instrumental in helping both the Global Support for Kids Initiative USA (GSKI) and, most recently, the Association for Child and Youth Care Practice (ACYCP) obtain their respective 501c(3) tax-exempt non-profit incorporation.]

Yield Giving, McKenzie Scott's philanthropic organization, is now accepting applications for \$1 million grants. This funding opportunity is for "community-led, community-focused organizations whose explicit purpose is to advance the voices and opportunities of individuals and families of meager or modest means, and groups who have met with discrimination and other systemic obstacles."

Any nonprofit in the United States that has had a \$1M - \$5M operating budget for two of the last four fiscal years is eligible to apply. 250 nonprofits will be selected to receive one of the \$1 million unrestricted awards, totaling to \$250 million in grant donations from Ms. Scott. Interested nonprofits must register for the open call by May 5, 2023 and submit their full application by June 12, 2023. The 250 chosen nonprofits will be announced in 2024.

Yield Giving is partnering with Lever for Change to implement a three step review process to select awardees. The first step will check nonprofits' eligibility, while the second and third step will review and score organizations. In the second step, fellow applicants will score applications with a rubric. The scoring rubric considers a nonprofit's commitment to equity, proven record, community representation within the organization, and organizational capacity. The top 1000 applications that make it to the third step will be considered by a 158 person evaluation panel of nonprofit leaders. McKenzie Scott's team will then make final decisions about the awardees.

Scholz Nonprofits Law has many clients who would be a great fit for this open call, and we encourage

all eligible nonprofits to apply to this great opportunity.

Getting students engaged with academic content begins with relationships and ensuring their basic needs are met.

That's according to Carey Arensberg, a 4th grade teacher in Alabama who leverages her social media platform to share trauma-informed teaching tips and practices with other educators.

Arensberg's emphasis on positive student-teacher relationships aligns with a body of research. Education Week reporter Madeline Will recently wrote in a new special report on the topic of student motivation and engagement that when students have an adult they can trust in their school building, they see "increased attendance, better grades, higher test scores, a sense of belonging and connectedness at school, and belief in one's self as a learner."



UW HEALTH CONFIRMS IT HAS SEEN CASES OF EMERGING DEADLY FUNGUS, SAYS PUBLIC SHOULDN'T WORRY RIGHT NOW

MADISON (WKOW) -- A newly emerging and potentially deadly fungus considered an "urgent threat" by the CDC has been spotted in UW Health facilities, an infectious disease physician confirmed to 27 News.

Candida auris is a fungus that appears to be drug resistant and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has labeled it a "serious global health threat."

Infectious Disease Physician Dr. Dave Andes said what makes the fungus particularly dangerous is its ability to resist treatments.

"It's uncommon, but it is dangerous for a number of reasons," Andes said. "One being that we don't have very many effective therapies."

INITIATIVE WITH WEBINAR, SPEAKERS SERIES FOR
TEENS, PARENTS, AND EMPLOYERS

MADISON – Teens are an important part of Wisconsin's labor force – with nearly 60% of state teens aged 16-19 working. Meanwhile, April marks a significant uptick in job-seeking activities for teens, and the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development has planned a month-long "Welcome to the Workforce" outreach initiative for students, parents, and employers.

DWD kicks off Welcome to the Workforce April 4, 2023, with a virtual panel discussion from 2-3 p.m. featuring representatives from the U.S. Department of Labor, Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, and Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development's Equal Rights and Youth Apprenticeship programs. Register for the panel on Eventbrite.

This effort to educate students, parents, and employers on their rights and responsibilities comes as Gov. Tony Evers declares April "Welcome to the Workforce Month" with a proclamation marking key historical achievements in regulating child labor.

Following the April 4 panel discussion, DWD will partner with community stakeholders to educate parents and students on minor worker rights, and employers on their responsibilities when employing minors. "Important life skills can be learned on the job and the participation of teens in the workforce helps businesses succeed while our economy thrives," said DWD Secretary-designee Amy Pechacek. "The Welcome to the Workforce webinar and speaker series will help teens, parents, and employers understand the rights, roles, and responsibilities covering those just starting out in the workforce. The sessions also will touch on ensuring safety at work and keeping school a priority when classes are in session."

Mentoring Positive is a dream come true and a testament to what can be achieved with a strong vision and a steadfast commitment to fulfilling the needs of community youth. In 2004, Will and Becky Green started Mentoring Positives as a nonprofit organization to mentor and support at-risk youth in Dane County. "We knew from the beginning that we needed to find a way to help vulnerable youth become leaders in their community," says Will. "We developed a program to do this through group mentoring, athletics, and entrepreneurship because, as we like to say, 'the hook is the key!' We guide our youth on a positive path of learning, practicing, and mastering socio-emotional well-being and leadership skills.

"Once we had the mentoring piece in place, we found we needed a way to generate income not only for the program to be able to serve the youth, but also so that we could provide employment opportunities for them." They set up office in the heart of Madison's Darbo-Worthington neighborhood and created Off the Block Salsas and Pizzas as a platform to inspire youth through social entrepreneurship while also providing job skills training and employment to those participating in the program.

In 2008, youth enrolled in the Mentoring Positives Leader Academy and worked with Will and Becky to create recipes for both a mild and a spicy salsa. The next year, the recipe won the first of many Battle of the Salsas at Metcalfe's Market in Hilldale. Popularity continues to grow with these products, and today, the youth in this expanded program produce over 600 jars of salsa each month.

One way that we strive for justice is by taking a hard look at data and the disproportionate impact the child welfare system has on children and families of color.

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
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
